

Why Costa Rica?

Home to spectacular cloud forests teeming with biodiversity, magnificent volcanoes, and pristine beaches bursting with marine life, Costa Rica offers a truly inspirational experience for students.

This stable and environmentally aware country is the perfect destination for: Biologists, Geographers, those interested in environmental issues and adventure!

Known as Central America's Garden of Eden, Costa Rica stands out from other Central American destinations as a stable country with highly developed health and education systems, and a government which plans to become the first carbon-neutral country in the world by 2021. Our Costa Rica Programme takes you from the cloud forest of Monteverde to the stunning Pacific Coast, via some of the most bio-diverse forests and breath-taking wildlife in the world! Few places on Earth offer as many life-changing educational experiences.

Useful facts

Geography: Bordering both the Caribbean and the Pacific Seas, Costa Rica has nearly 1300km of coastline. These coastal plains are separated by a rugged spine of mountains straddling the continental divide. Most of your trip will be located at low altitudes, reaching up to 1400m in the Monteverde Cloud Forest.

Climate: Situated just north of the Equator, Costa Rica has a tropical climate (23 - 30°C) enjoying over 12 hours of sunshine a day year-round. In summer months it can rain, although there is a mini-dry season in July and at the start of August on the western Pacific Coast.

Languages: Spanish is the official and most wide spoken language in Costa Rica, and there are at least five local indigenous languages. In many of the areas you visit, people will also speak English as a second language.

Culture: During the trip, you will learn about the rich Spanish influence on Costa Rica's culture and customs, and the Ticos (Costa Ricans) search to live the '*Pura Vida*'.

Physical rating: Physically this is a moderate trip. The ability to walk with a daysack (3-4 hours), is required.

Accommodation: You will stay in a mixture of comfortable hotels and lodge accommodation.

Sample itinerary

Build Up Day

The day before departure, all team members will meet at the school. Your Global Action Leader will check your kit and run through health and safety briefings.

Days 1 - 2: UK – Costa Rica

Your exciting adventure begins, as you fly from the UK to San Jose, the vibrant, modern capital of Costa Rica. San Jose is set in the middle of the central valley and surrounded by high mountains. The city enjoys an English summer like climate and high-quality cultural events year-round.

On arrival at Juan Santamaría international airport, you will meet our local guides, and travel to your accommodation. You will see the Spanish influence in some architecture, of theatres, museums and houses in the city centre. The city is named in honour of Joseph of Nazareth.

Days 3 - 5: Monteverde Cloud Forest

Conservation, Biodiversity, Ecology and Protection of Endangered Species

You travel to the spectacular Monteverde Cloud Forest, described by National Geographic as "the jewel in the crown of cloud forest reserves". Cloud forests are associated with high biodiversity and endemism.

Resting at 1,400 metres (4,600 feet) above sea level, The Monteverde Cloud Forest is an internationally protected conservation area of vital importance: it has the largest number of orchids in the world, over 100 species of mammals, 400 species of birds and many endemic species from North and South America.



In the afternoon you will visit Santa Elena, where you will have a chance to buy local souvenirs. Your guide will explain about the changes in Monteverde over the past 45 years and the creation of the Cloud Forest Reserve. At the end of the day you can visit the **Frog Project** run by biologists, naturalist guides, and conservationists, who are passionate about promoting the importance of conserving amphibians and their unique ecology. This inspiring project has even created specific simulations of the natural habitat for 28 frog and toad species, allowing successful breeding of many endemic species.

The following day you will explore Monteverde Cloud Forest's well-marked trails and see how climate change is affecting this world-famous cloud forest with its amazing variety of flora and fauna species. If you are lucky you might spot a sloth, or hear a howler monkey roaring, or a resplendent Quetzal, one of the most beautiful birds in the world. You will learn about animal behaviour, biodiversity, ecotourism and sustainability.

Monteverde is a great example of sustainable tourism at its best. You can even step on the Continental Divide, where one foot will be on the Caribbean side and the other on the Pacific side!

You will have a talk from **The Monteverde Cloud Forest Biological Reserve** learning about the importance of international conservation efforts and the management and monitoring of natural resources. This will include learning about measuring the impact of climate change, endangered species monitoring, and the economic and social impact of the Monteverde Reserve on neighbouring communities in Costa Rica.

Days 6 – 7: NATUWA Wildlife Sanctuary

NATUWA wildlife sanctuary provides refuge and protection to the wild animals that have been affected by humans, due to hunting, removal from their environment, and deforestation. The sanctuary works with the **Ministry of Environment and Energy** under the Costa Rica's conservation law. The projects and programmes run here look after Jaguars, tapirs, sloths, Macaws and monkeys.



The sanctuary is run by volunteers, and is popular with university students to gain work experience. They also have an outreach programme which aims to educate the local community about their work, and the benefits of ecotourism. Their conservation programme includes a captive breeding programme with Costa Rica's Macaws rescuing, rehabilitating, and releasing Macaws back to the wild.

On arrival, you will meet the volunteers who run the centre, have a tour, and enjoy a presentation on animal conservation in Costa Rica, the illegal trade of animals, environmental protection, and how to rehabilitate animals. Activities will depend on what the sanctuary needs help with at the time you visit. Over the next few days, this could include:

- Maintenance & extending animal enclosures; building a new bath for Tapirs
- Building and painting the Macaws' house to help rehabilitation when re-released back into the wild
- Reforestation; Helping to prepare the animals' food

Days 8 - 12: Nicoya Peninsula

Permaculture, Sea Turtle Conservation, and Blue Flag Project

You'll travel over land, ferry and walk along a beach to your project, located in the Nicoya Peninsula on the stunning Pacific Coast. You will be hosted by a national wildlife centre which connects people to the environment and provides hands-on learning about sustainable development and environmental conservation.

On arrival, you will meet the inspiring team of researchers who you will be living and working alongside for the next four days, and settle into your accommodation. There are three sections to your project: permaculture, turtle conservation and the blue flag programme.

You will be fully immersed into life on the research project, learning the practical skills needed to make a real contribution during your stay, as well as learning about the history and long-term impacts of the project.

You will join the researchers in activities which include:

- **Permaculture:** participating in: composting, tree planting, work in the greenhouse and tree nursey, learning about sustainable farming methods, and living with minimal impact
- Blue flag Project: beach clean, making signs to educate local about environment & conservation in the area
- Sea Turtles: Night beach patrols for nesting turtles and hatchling nests; Collecting, counting eggs and relocating eggs to the protection of the hatchery; A tour and work in the baby turtle hatchery; Release of new hatchling turtles



The Nicoya Peninsula comprises northern Guanacaste Province and southern Puntarenas Province, and the area's beaches are an important nesting site for turtles. In July and August **Olive Ridley Sea Turtles** (*Lepidochelys olivacea*) nest on the beaches in the area. Classified as a vulnerable species by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN), conservation efforts along this coast are extremely important.

In July if you see turtles, they will probably be nesting. There is a better chance of seeing sea turtles in August for hatching. To increase your chance of seeing a sea turtle, it is important to stay quiet while doing the patrols. The patrols are done in 2 shifts late at night or early in the morning and involves a few hours walking on sandy beaches - so you need relatively good fitness. While on patrols, keep your eyes open for tracks of mother turtles coming onto the beach to lay eggs!

While here, you will also participate in the **blue flag programme** overseen by the charity **Nicoya Peninsula Waterkeeper**, get involved in a beach clean, learning about why beach pollution is so harmful, and the negative impact of microplastic.

After completing your beach clean you will see first-hand how the local community created and set up their own small scale recycling system with collection points and educational signs about best practice. You will get to take the rubbish and recycling you collected from your beach clean to a local recycle depot to see the whole recycling cycle. We've been really inspired to see how this local community work with a company, **Bionics**, who process the recycling into alternative products, such as clothing and shoes.

You will also have a chance to enjoy your incredible surroundings and the people in it, from relaxing on the pristine beach to volleyball games, and even Salsa dancing!



Days 13 - 14: Relax in San José, and return home

We travel back to San José and have a relaxed afternoon sightseeing and visiting the colourful markets. The next day, you check into Juan Santamaria International Airport, with time to reflect on your unique adventure: from exploring spectacular cloud forests, to learning from the environmental organisations preserving Costa Rica's future.

You will arrive back in the UK with memories to last a lifetime, and the ASDAN Universities Award!

Charities and Conservation agencies we support in Costa Rica




