Your Global Action Programme

At Global Action, we believe in engaging young people in Global Learning about poverty reduction, environmental issues and social justice. This develops Global Citizens, able to effect positive global change for the future.

Global Action programmes engage students with global issues, carefully designed around the UN agreed Sustainable Development Goals. Your trip will explore how these goals are being achieved on an international scale, and what still needs to be done.

Why Zanzibar?

The tropical island archipelago of Zanzibar is world famous for spectacular coral reefs, sandy beaches, and coastal forests supporting many endemic and critically endangered species.

Zanzibar's coral reefs are among the most diverse and productive communities on Earth. Each habitat supports hundreds of coral and reef fish species. The islands' forests form one of the world's 25 most important biodiversity hotspots.

Zanzibar has won awards for sustainable tourism, and the islands' unique ecosystems offer a diversity of locations for you to learn about:

- Biodiversity, Ecosystems, Ecology, Evolution, Food Chains
- Conservation and human impact on the environment, Climate Change, Marine Biology
- Tropical Forests, Oceans, Poverty Reduction, Enterprise Development through Sustainable Resources







Useful facts

Geography: Zanzibar is located 36km off mainland Tanzania. The marine biodiversity in the Zanzibar Archipelago is world-famous. Different forests also support many endemic and critically endangered species.

Climate: Zanzibar is warm year-round, average maximum July temperatures of 28°C, and very low rainfall.

Languages: Zanzibaris speak a pure form of Swahili, and many believe Zanzibar is the birthplace of this language. English is widely understood, so you will have no problem communicating with everyone!

Culture: In 1964 the islands joined the new republic of Tanzania. As a semi-autonomous region, Zanzibar has its own parliament and president. Zanzibar is today inhabited mostly by ethnic Swahili.

Physical rating: Physically this is an easy trip: good proficiency in swimming is required.

Accommodation: You will be staying in comfortable Guest Houses throughout.

Sample itinerary

Build Up Day

The day before departure, all team members will meet at the school. Your Global Action Trip Leader will check your kit and run through health and safety briefings. You will also have an introduction into Zanzibar's unique history, culture and the spice island way of life.

Days 1 – 2: Home – Zanzibar

Today your adventure begins with an overnight flight, arriving the following morning on the beautiful, palm-fringed island of Zanzibar. On arrival at Zanzibar's international airport, you will meet our Global Action local partner and guide, and travel to your hotel in Stone Town.

After lunch, you will have a short visit into Stone Town, a UNESCO World Heritage site and one of the most unique settlements in the world due to its fascinating history. You will change your UK Pounds into Tanzanian Shillings and have a chance to buy traditional 'kangas' (for girls) and 'kikois' (for boys) to wear – brightly coloured cotton wraps which are culturally respectful and help protect you from sunburn on boat trips.







Days 3-7:

During this time, you will be based in Stone Town and can enjoy a variety of unique seminars and interactive workshops:

Biodiversity, Climate change, Conservation, Food Chains

A big highlight of your Zanzibar adventure will be the opportunity to snorkel on spectacular coral reefs that surround the island. As well as being stunning environments to explore, these living ecosystems are critically important to Zanzibar, supporting fisheries which provide food and income for local people, protecting coastal communities and beaches from storms, and fixing carbon from the atmosphere helping to slow down climate change. You will also enjoy paddleboarding through the mangroves as you learn about why these precious ecosystems are so important to marine life.

You will carry out observational surveys and learn about: why coral reefs and mangrove forests are some of the most diverse ecosystems on our planet; why it is important to conserve these ecosystems; the roles played by coral reefs, and mangroves, in slowing down climate change; threats to them and how they can be protected.

You also explore the Menai Bay Conservation Area, looking out for Bottlenose and Humpback as you travel through their feeding grounds. On Kwale Island, you will sail into a hidden lagoon lined by mangrove forest and swim in the clear waters surrounding the trees, whilst observing their unique tree root systems up close. You will then visit a number of reefs around this island and others in the area, comparing the observations you make here to the reefs you have previously snorkelled on.

Zanzibari History and Culture

Kizimbani village in central Zanzibar shows how Zanzibar was an important producer for the global Spice Trade, and the world's leading clove producer. You visit a beautiful plantation to see how saffron and vanilla are produced, along with many Asian and Middle Eastern spices. Taste some of the delicious fruit grown here: jackfruit, pineapples, and mangos!







You will enjoy fun lessons in Swahili language, with the Institute of Kiswahili and Foreign Affairs, a guided tour of Stone Town which is a fascinating highlight – it is one of the most unique settlements in the world, due to its unique blend of Indian, African, and Middle Eastern influences and architecture.

You will also have a traditional Zanzibari dinner, cooked for you by a local Zanzibari lady in her own home. You will be treated to a spread of delicious dishes, and opportunities to ask how women's livelihoods have improved.

Gender Equality, Responsible Consumption and Production

On the outskirts of Stone Town, you will visit 'Chako' to learn about the Tourist2Tourist concept, and how they are working to provide an innovative way to reduce the hospitality industry's footprint on the Island's environment, encouraging the local community to recycle whilst supporting and celebrating local design. You will be given a tour of the Chako production line and shown how everything works in the workshop, before being split into small groups to help with the daily tasks. These tasks could include: separating & cleaning the plastic and bottles, shredding the plastics, packing of products. You will also have the opportunity to make your own drinking glass to take home with you!





Days 8 - 13:

For the next few days you will be based in Paje, a small village located on the southeast coast between the villages of Bwejuu and Jambiani. The team will have a chance to relax, and experience the beautiful white sandy beach, and shallow waters.

Enterprise development through sustainable resources

You will participate in an interactive Workshop at the Zanzibar Cultural Arts Centre - which supports sustainable livelihoods by training local people in artistic techniques using recycled materials, to provide income generation. You can join in making soap, recycled paper books, and handmade jewellery.

You also visit the beautiful Mwani Seaweed Centre. Seaweed farming is the second biggest industry in Zanzibar: used for making soap, shampoos, medicines, and export to Japanese restaurants. Meet female seaweed farmers, learn how they have improved their livelihoods through this novel farming practice.

Your team will visit the award-winning Zanzibar Butterfly Centre, one of Africa's largest butterfly centres, established to provide local income while promoting conservation. You will receive a briefing from one the project workers and learn about the trade of butterflies and how they are promoting the farming of them to support local farmers' incomes. Afterwards you will have a unique opportunity to spend some time with a Zanzibari butterfly farmer, learn how they are farming the butterflies, and ask questions about their challenges and achievements.

The team will have the opportunity to visit a local Sponge Farm, to learn how locals are being trained in the commercialisation of sponge farming. This provides an additional income stream for many local communities, whilst relieving the pressure on local sponge species numbers and fish stock through overfishing. We will see the see the sponge farms up close and learn how they are set up, maintained, harvested and processed for an international market.

Ecosystems, Wildlife Protection, Ecotourism







Zanzibar's tropical forests form one of the world's 25 most important biodiversity areas for conservation. Habitats within the park include a groundwater forest, and coastal forest and grassland, with mangroves on the coast. Jozani Forest is a haven for rare, endemic and endangered island wildlife. Here, you will see the Zanzibar red colobus monkey, an endangered species on the IUCN Red List, which is endemic to Zanzibar and one of the rarest monkeys in Africa. You can carry out an observational survey of their primate behaviour. You can learn about mangrove biology and ecology: how mangroves cope with high salinity, and how different species of mangrove tree have adapted.

Jozani Forest is also the ideal place to learn how the critical role of ecotourism is protecting this national park. CARE International have established forest management programmes here that provide a sustainable income for villagers, while conserving the forest.

Days 14 - 15: Zanzibar - Home

In the late afternoon, you check into Zanzibar's International airport, and return home. You can reflect on your unique adventures and new-found knowledge in: Sustainable Development, Marine Ecology, Biodiversity and Conservation, natural resource management, and Swahili culture.

You will have earned the ASDAN Universities Award and gained an in-depth understanding of Biology and Geography subjects, in one of the most remarkable islands of the World!

Charities and Cooperatives we support in Zanzibar



Zanzibar Butterfly Centre - one of Africa's largest butterfly centres - reducing poverty, while promoting conservation and sustainable use of resources. You will learn how women farmers can integrate butterfly farming around childcare and domestic duties, providing a rare opportunity for sustainable income generation for women.



Chako is a social, creative, and environmental enterprise creating design products and accessories from upcycled waste materials produced by the hospitality industry. They provide an innovative way to reduce the hospitality industry's footprint on the Island's environment, encouraging the local community to recycle, supporting and celebrating local design. Chako focuses on making gender inequality less significant, by giving women the chance to develop their skills and become more self-aware and independent. Being in employment provides women with a reliable monthly income which creates a more stable situation for them and their families.



Jozani-Chwaka Bay National Park - Zanzibar's tropical forests form one of the world's 25 most important biodiversity areas for conservation, and this park is being proposed as a World Heritage Site. Jozani is home to many endemic and endangered wildlife: the Red Colobus monkey (an endangered species on the IUCN Red List, endemic to Zanzibar and one of the rarest monkeys in Africa), Ader's duiker (a very rare antelope), the Pemba flying fox, and the giant coconut crab (the world's largest land crab, which has evolved to live on land).



Mwani Seaweed Centre – a cooperative that provides poor female seaweed farmers with opportunities to improve their livelihoods. The centre comprises a factory and gathering site to produce soaps and creams from seaweed.

Menai Bay Conservation Area (MBCA)

Zanzibar's largest marine protected area, which controls illegal fishing, and supports alternative income initiatives: bee keeping, mangrove replanting, tree nurseries and tourism. It is a participatory project with 19 villages pursuing conservation efforts.



The Cultural Arts Centre promotes Zanzibari culture and increases awareness of recycling on the island while providing sustainable livelihoods for local people. These artists make and sell jewellery, book covers and homemade paper. The income from this is reinvested to allow more artists to be supported.


- Part-time work/Summer job
