

Why Costa Rica?

There is so much to learn from this small but mighty country! Known for its incredible biodiversity, the country is home to a rich variety of wildlife that thrives in its lush ecosystems. It stands as a global leader in environmental solutions, paving the way for sustainability through innovative practices. Costa Rica's Indigenous cultures offer invaluable knowledge and traditions, deeply rooted in harmony with nature. Additionally, the nation's commitment to sustainable agriculture showcases how development and environmental conservation can go hand in hand. Costa Rica is a shining example of how small nations can make a significant global impact.

Biodiversity: Costa Rica is a global leader in environmental conservation, boasting about 5% of the world's biodiversity despite its small size. It has rainforests, cloud forests, and diverse wildlife such as sloths, toucans, and sea turtles.

Renewable Energy: The country generates nearly all of its electricity from renewable resources like hydro, wind, and geothermal power.

No Military: Costa Rica abolished its military in 1948 and has instead invested the money in education, healthcare, and environmental initiatives.

Indigenous Territories: Indigenous people make up about 2.4% of Costa Rica's population. There are 8 main indigenous groups residing in various territories across the country.

Useful facts

Geography: Bordering both the Caribbean Sea and the Pacific Ocean, Costa Rica has nearly 1300km of coastline. These coastal plains are separated by a rugged spine of mountains straddling the continental divide. Most of your trip will be located at low altitudes, reaching up to 1400m in the Monteverde Cloud Forest.

Climate: Situated just north of the Equator, Costa Rica has a tropical climate (23 - 30°C) enjoying over 12 hours of sunshine a day year-round. March and April are the driest months - in summer months it can rain, usually with heavy downpours occurring in the afternoons or overnight on the Caribbean Coast.

Language: Spanish is the official and most wide spoken language in Costa Rica, and there are at least five local indigenous languages, including Bribri, which you will get to learn during your stay with the community. In many of the areas you visit, people will also speak English as a second language.

Culture: During the trip, you will learn about the rich Spanish influence on Costa Rica's culture and customs, and the Ticos (Costa Ricans) search to live the 'Pura Vida'. Costa Rica is also home to diverse indigenous cultures, including the Bribri, Cabécar, and Boruca, who maintain unique traditions, languages, and social structures.

Physical rating: This is a moderate trip; due to the work at the project and the heat in the summer, you will need the ability to walk with a daysack (3-4 hours).

Accommodation: Hostels and lodges

Sample itinerary

Day 1: Arrival into San Jose

Your exciting adventure begins, as you fly into Costa Rica's capital City, San Jose. San Jose is set in the middle of the central valley and surrounded by high mountains. The city enjoys a temperate climate and high-quality cultural events year-round.

On arrival at Juan Santamaría International Airport, you will meet our local guides, and travel to your accommodation.

Day 2-5: Monteverde Cloud Forest and NATUWA

You travel to the spectacular Monteverde Cloud Forest, described by National Geographic as "the jewel in the crown of cloud forest reserves". Cloud forests are associated with high biodiversity and endemism. Resting at 1,400 metres (4,600 feet) above sea level, The Monteverde Cloud Forest is an internationally protected conservation area of vital importance: it has the largest number of orchids in the world, over 100 species of mammals, 400 species of birds and many endemic species from North and South America.

En-route to Monteverde, you will make a stop at NATUWA wildlife sanctuary which provides refuge and protection to the wild animals that have been affected by humans, due to hunting, removal from their environment, and deforestation. The sanctuary works with the Ministry of Environment and Energy under the Costa Rica's conservation law. The projects and programmes run here look after jaguars, tapirs, sloths, macaws and monkeys.

The sanctuary is run by volunteers, and is popular with university students to gain work experience. They also have an outreach programme which aims to educate the local community about their work, and the benefits of ecotourism. Their conservation programme includes a captive breeding programme with Costa Rica's macaws rescuing, rehabilitating, and releasing macaws back to the wild.

On arrival, you will meet the volunteers who run the centre, have a tour, and learn about animal conservation in Costa Rica, the illegal trade of animals, environmental protection, and how to rehabilitate animals. After an exciting introduction to Costa Rica's wildlife, you will continue your journey to Monteverde where you will settle into your accommodation for the night.







Over the following few days, you will explore Monteverde Cloud Forest's well-marked trails and see how climate change is affecting this world-famous cloud forest with its amazing variety of flora and fauna species. If you are lucky, you might spot a sloth, or hear a howler monkey roaring, or a resplendent Quetzal, one of the most beautiful birds in the world. You will learn about animal behaviour, biodiversity, ecotourism and sustainability.

Monteverde is a great example of sustainable tourism at its best. You can even step on the Continental Divide, where one foot will be on the Caribbean side and the other on the Pacific side!

You will have a talk from The Monteverde Cloud Forest Biological Reserve learning about the importance of international conservation efforts and the management and monitoring of natural resources. This will include

learning about measuring the impact of climate change, endangered species monitoring, and the economic and social impact of the Monteverde Reserve on neighbouring communities in Costa Rica.





Day 6-7: Volcanoes and The Caribbean Coast

Leave the cool cloud forests of Monteverde and head for the tropical lowlands of the Caribbean coast! But first, you will drive around the great Lake Arenal - Costa Rica's largest landlocked body of water – soaking up the stunning views of forested hills with the Arenal Volcano on the horizon. Stop off for some lunch and a hike around the volcano before settling in for the night in La Fortuna. Most of the power produced in Costa Rica comes from this area, so it's a great opportunity to observe the volcanic landscape and discover how wind, hydro and geothermal energy are harnessed.



The next day, you will continue the long drive to the Southern Caribbean coast, passing by huge green forests where the trees seem to grow into the clouds! As you look out of the window, you will notice fincas (farms) and agricultural land with crops such as pineapples and bananas. You will begin to get an idea of what life looks like for rural communities and people living outside of Costa Rica's main cities and tourist spots. If you keep your eyes peeled you may even be lucky enough to spot some wildlife on the drive, such as howler or white-faced monkeys!

On arrival at your accommodation in Limon Province, it's time for an early night, ready to start your hike to the Bribri territory in the morning.

Day 8-12: Bribri Indigenous Territory and the Caribbean Coast

You will be up bright and early this morning to enjoy a hearty breakfast before beginning your hike to the remote Yorkin territory of the indigenous Bribri people, right on the border with Panama! You will pass through remote communities scattered alongside the Yorkin River, witnessing breathtaking views of the river and rainforest beyond.

On arrival in Yorkin, you will be greeted by smiling faces and some freshly prepared pancakes and fruit juice! You will receive an introductory talk from the one of the women who founded the Stibrawpa Association. This is a grass-roots project in which the women sought additional ways to build their local economy and provide realistic opportunities for members of the community to remain on their land, without having to leave home to find work. You'll begin to understand the history and culture of the indigenous people in this area and how the Stibrawpa Association has provided a vital lifeline.





Indigenous people in Costa Rica, such as the Bribri, face significant challenges due to limited support from the government. Although Costa Rica has backed international agreements such as the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, the reality on the ground often falls short of these commitments. Minimum standards for human rights and fundamental freedoms are not always tailored to address the unique circumstances and needs of indigenous peoples.

Some key issues faced include:

- Land Rights Violations: Indigenous territories are frequently encroached upon by non-indigenous settlers.
- Poverty and Inequality: Indigenous communities experience disproportionately high poverty rates.
- **Environmental and Cultural Threats**: Indigenous land is often threatened by mining, petroleum exploration, and other activities that degrade the environment and disrupt traditional ways of life.

During your stay in Yorkin, you will have the opportunity to experience a variety of activities firsthand, such as: roof weaving, bow and arrow shooting, making sugar cane juice, creating traditional handicrafts, taking a Bribri language lesson, identifying medicinal plants, and making chocolate.

Your visit not only provides additional income for these rural and often marginalized communities but shows support and gives them a voice and a chance for their culture and knowledge to be preserved and shared for future generations both in Costa Rica, and globally.







As your visit to Yorkin comes to an end, you will hike back out of the territory and travel back to the Caribbean coast for a final day exploring the Gandoca Manzanillo National Wildlife Refuge. This is an amazing area for spotting wildlife in its natural habitat, as the refuge is home to a wide variety of species and covers approximately 23,000 acres including rainforests, wetlands, lagoons, coral reefs and beaches. It serves as a hub for ecotourism and environmental education, offering visitors a chance to learn about the cultural and ecological importance of the area. The land has historical ties to indigenous communities and the Afro-Caribbean culture, adding a rich cultural layer to its natural beauty.



Day 13-14: Travel back to the city, and return home

You will travel back to San José and have a relaxed final meal before checking into Juan Santamaria International Airport, with time to reflect on your unique adventure in a Global Learning Review: from exploring spectacular cloud forests, to learning from the indigenous communities and wildlife organisations preserving Costa Rica's future. You will arrive home with memories to last a lifetime, and the ASDAN Universities Award!


Stibrawpa Association is a community-led ecotourism initiative working to preserve cultural heritage of the Yorkin community while using resources in a sustainable way.




